Our Day in Reception

Policy on Outdoor Play



Children get wet, muddy and messy when they play outside. Please provide protective clothing for them to wear, including clearly named wellington boots.

Children must be allowed to experience the world around them in a full, messy, muddy, wet environment if they are to make useful meaning of it.





Our curriculum

In the Reception Class, we follow the Early Years Framework. Your child will be learning skills; acquiring new knowledge and demonstrating their understanding through seven areas of learning and development. Children should mostly develop the three prime areas first. These are:

Communication and language Physical development Personal, social and emotional development

These prime areas are those most essential for your child's healthy development and future learning. As children grow, the prime areas will help them to develop skills in four specific areas. These are:

Literacy Mathematics Understanding the world Expressive arts and design

These seven areas are used to plan your child's learning and activities. The professionals teaching and supporting your child will make sure that the activities are suited to your child's unique needs. This is a little bit like a curriculum in primary and secondary schools, but it is suitable for very young children, and is designed to be really flexible so that staff can follow your child's unique needs and interests. Through the EYFS, children learn by playing and exploring, being active, and through creative and critical thinking, which takes place both indoors and outside.


Phonics will be an important part of your child's learning in Literacy. We will teach phonics in class and send phased reading books home for practise. We will meet with you in the Autumn Term to explain this further.

The Unique Child reaches out to relate to people and things through the **Characteristics of Effective Learning**, which move through all areas of learning.

- playing and exploring
- active learning
- · creating and thinking critically

Children develop in the context of relationships and the environment around them.

This is unique to each family, and reflects individual communities and cultures.



Prime areas are fundamental, work together, and move through to support development in all other areas.

- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Communication and Language
- Physical Development

Specific areas include essential skills and knowledge for children to participate successfully in society.

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

There is no exhaustive list of things that your child must be able to do before they come to school. We will meet your child where they are and support them in making their next steps, whatever they may be. Here are some ideas which might be useful for you

Talk about school. Always be positive and enthusiastic about all the fun things that will happen at school, use their teacher's name so it feels familiar and talk about the new friends they'll make. You'll find plenty of books at your local library that bring the school day to life.

Go to the toilet, wash and dry their hands. The NHS hand washing song is fun and effective. Make sure your child is happy going to the toilet on their own, their uniform is easy to pull down and up. Don't worry if they have the odd accident as they're settling in - it's ok, nobody will be cross with them. It's something teachers and teaching assistants are used to; and help is at hand when it's needed.

Practise getting dressed and undressed independently. Can your child put their shoes on the right feet? Can they take their coat on and off and do up their zip?

Read stories every day. This is the most useful thing that you can do at home to support your child's learning. Read funny stories, scary stories, stories from around the world, read whatever you like but have fun with it.

Help them recognise their name. It's helpful if your child can recognise their name written down (you can practise this when you're labelling all their stuff!). But really don't worry if they aren't there yet.

Sharing and taking turns. If your child has brothers or sisters, or they've been to nursery or pre-school, they'll be used to this already. But it's always good to check they've understood that sharing is a two-way process!
