# Personification

Personification is a special kind of metaphor – where inanimate objects are given human characteristics.

When we listened to 'The School Bell' yesterday, there were many examples of personification.

# Rhyme, alliteration, assonance

With *rhyme*, the end sounds of the words are the same: *Found*, *Ground*, *Around*.

With **alliteration**, the beginning sounds are the same: Magical Mountains.

With **assonance**, the sound between syllables of nearby words are the same:

Around the Mountain was a sound.

He willed the milling people to fill the church.

# Onomatopoeia

A word that sounds like the common sound of the object it is describing.


These words are all examples of onomatopoeia:

- The sheep went, "Baa."
- The bridge collapsed creating a tremendous **boom**.
- The large dog said, "Bow-wow!"
- Are you afraid of things that go **bump** in the night?
- Both bees and buzzers buzz.
- The cash register popped open with a heart-warming *ca-ching*.
- The dishes fell to the floor with a **clatter**.
- Nothing annoys me more than rapidly clicking your pen.
